I am very bad at Spelling  
and time is getting short  
I have reached the age  
of 83 + 9 months. I have been  
house bound for years with  
arthritis. How I would  
like to go down Tullow St  
and my Beloved Bride -  
well Lane again. Potato  
Market the old new Rd.  
Mr Burns some time ago  
had a letter in our Local  
Paper that the Lane was  
the Poorest Part of the  
Town But he did not  
know the first thing  
about it. from Harrys  
corner to Maxwells at the

The Rottom, three Hall  
door and Privet House  
was all in Bridewell Lane  
we had no hole in the  
wall windows.

There was a few small  
houses like all the houses  
built all over the town  
even the council houses.  
built in Barrack St  
and Staplestown Rd.  
little Bark St had the  
River flowing at the Back  
like the few ones in  
Bridewell Lane they had  
6 + 7 steps with a hand  
Rail. All the Rest of the  
houses had from 4 to 6  
and 7 Rooms in them

The old Bridewell was  
where the Corn Mill (Whelans)  
with Mr J Power was the man  
that run it for the owners,  
(hence the name  
Bridewell Lane)

Then came Leonard  
Williams house in the  
yard then Slattery house,  
Larance Byrne the shoe  
maker. then 7 or 9 houses  
all with upskatt to  
them. the one that  
Mrs Phelan lived in  
was a very big one with  
a shop counter and Big  
window. K. medals lived

opposite with a counter  
end Big window, <sup>it</sup> had  
6 apartments. The house  
that Mr. Phelan lived  
in I remember a man  
called Frank Murphy he  
kept a Bacon shop, he  
sold American Bacon  
on fair days all the famous  
baught Big sides <sup>of Bacon</sup> it  
was very fat but it had  
a lovely taste he was also  
agent for the America  
Shipping Co and he was  
scooled to be a Millionaire  
he kept a ~~house~~ <sup>house</sup> ~~keeper~~ <sup>keeper</sup> and  
gave the famous <sup>house</sup> ~~house~~ <sup>house</sup> dinner  
he was a relation of Murphy

The draper in Tullow St.  
and the carrier at the  
top, had land the carrier  
man had a horse + cart  
and were always busy  
and never wanted for  
anything. They had a  
Boy killed in the First  
World war (his name was  
Matt). Then next to them  
Paddy Deere the cabbler  
he rented part of Coddys  
in Tullow St. then came the  
Loscovan family all workers  
in Thompsons then next  
to Phelans the Byrne  
family. Joe and Peter

they were Farmers and  
Land up the Black Bog  
they had Milking cows  
which we all Bought.

Mickie Connors worked  
for them, and Peter kept  
a Potato Store where Mr  
Doran kept his car in  
after years, then came Mr  
Kate McGrath she kept  
a Shop and sold everything  
<sup>next</sup> our own house then Mulhall.  
then Bill Gaffneys this house  
was left unfinished.

Byrnes. McGrath and ours  
one were Built the Same,  
with Shutters on all the

Windows, they had a  
Front Hall + two steps  
down to the Bottom hall  
The stairs + kitchen was  
off that. a large landing  
with two steps up to the Front  
Room with two large windows  
and the Back Room the windows  
also had Shutters and we could  
see Sluicocks fields also the  
Hanover house we could even  
see Graigue Chapel + Burn Bridge  
and a night the light from  
Grandy Row used to shine  
over my Bed. By the way  
at the Bottom of the yards of these  
4 houses. There was a Row of  
houses they were Built of Stone  
and in the Battle of Potato Mkt

The People was burnt out of  
them, the New Road covered up  
History.

My Father was in the Boer  
war and wounded in the Battle  
of Colenso of which he had  
a Pension he used to get every  
3 months My Mother would  
buy our foot-wear in January  
and in April she would  
buy stuff and make our  
cloths, she had a foot-  
machine that belonged  
to her Mother I think she  
made the shrouds for all the  
little children that died in  
Potato Market + B Lane  
she used to earn money  
with her Machine

I Remember the day that the  
First World War broke out  
4<sup>th</sup> August 1914 and all the  
Reserve men was called up  
Jimmie Doyle. Martin Geoghagan  
Tommy Geoghagan (Brothers)  
Martin was missing Tommy  
was taking Pipers at the  
Battle of Mons Ned Farrell  
from Mill Lane was the first  
from Carlow to be killed. Those  
from Bridwell Lane that was  
killed was Matt Carey + Francis  
Paddy Mulhall died from wounds  
Peter Tierney. Peter Finn Paddy -  
Moran Paddy Downer  
Timmy Bigley lost a sea  
Peg Hayden from Burn St  
Mrs Bigley's Brother Wm  
Farroll (Hayden) from Lock Pit Lane

and the 2 Nolan Brothers  
also from Lock Pit Lane and  
Jim Holden (whose mother was  
hook in the Royal Hotel for  
years) also came from B Lane;  
The Mulhall Family always  
had had to do with circuses  
& Play Folk, there daughter  
May was married to my  
uncle Ned Walker my moth-  
er's younger brother. She had two  
more Peter and Tom. Both were  
Butchers with the Oliver family  
in Dublin St and later Tom worked  
with the Heam family, a Butcher shop  
that got burnt down and was  
homed up for years. Mr & Slater  
built it up into a fish shop  
(By the way the Heam family was no  
relation to Hearns) Uncle Tom  
worked for Tom Hearns and during

The first world war he went  
to England and died there.  
now back to Bridwell Lane. The Traher  
Family was Farmers. The Bradley  
& Trodden Family never wanted for  
anything, Martin worked in all the  
Big houses in the county and  
Mary Kate worked in Mollays  
Hosery Factory and then with  
Mr Johnson the tinsmith in  
Dublin St. Mr David Mulhall  
and his son worked for Mr  
Fred Thompson in the leather  
linema which was built  
during the 1914 to 1918 war Mr  
Jimmy Byrne worked there also  
Harry Eldred O'm was  
a tailor with Mr Williams  
in Dublin St. Davey was his  
Eldred and never wanted.

for anything. Annie  
went off with Dobells,  
and Kathleen + Judy  
went on the stage.  
Lisia Maor had 3  
houses and 3 of her son  
~~and~~ worked for Miss  
Ryem on the boats. BRick  
went England. Liz. Mary  
& Killa married. Lusa  
made puddings, you  
never tasted anything  
like them. & Liz used to  
make Potted herrings for the  
Black fast days. Tim  
was killed in The Boer  
war. My father was

wounded at the Battle of  
Colenso, he had a Pension  
he got it, the 1<sup>st</sup> January  
the 1<sup>st</sup> of April, 1<sup>st</sup> July  
the 1<sup>st</sup> October, My Mother  
bought cotton and made  
dresses for Mallie, Nell,  
Kathleen + myself, when  
I was young it was sailor  
suits was the fashion and  
they were lovely. she had  
Sewing machine which  
belonged to her Mother, she  
bought footwear and  
under wear we were very  
lucky. she also made  
little shrouds for all the  
little Babes that died

and turned them with  
Blue for baby boys & Pink  
for baby girls, for which  
she did not charge.

I remember Lady Aberdeen  
coming to Carlisle she  
came for to teach us how  
to avoid consumption as it  
was called then, I was in  
the infant school and our  
names was put in a hat  
and Midge Mulhall.

Emmie Fin from Bridwell  
Lane and Laura Kelly from  
Pollerton Rd was picked to  
meet her and present her  
with flowers, the nuns  
made lovely white dresses

for them. I remember  
seen the H. Comet I was  
about 8 or 9 at the time (I am  
85 today) it was over Lullow  
St direction over James  
& Dorans it was very bright  
and had a long tail in a  
clear sky
